SEEING INTO SOLITARY REVIEW OF SOLITARY CONFINEMENT PRACTICES AROUND THE WORLD: A STUDY OF 35 JURISDICTIONS

Solitary confinement currently affects an estimated 80,000 to 100,000 prisoners in the United States, and many more around the world, each day. The overuse and misuse of solitary confinement around the world has been a principal issue of concern for the **Special Rapporteur on Torture Juan E. Méndez (SRT)**. In his groundbreaking report on solitary confinement from 2011, the SRT categorically recognized that the practice can amount to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment, and even torture.

This side-event will explore the publication of a groundbreaking study of laws, policies, and practice of solitary confinement in 35 jurisdictions around the world. The study, commissioned by the Special Rapporteur on Torture from the Cyrus R. Vance Center for International Justice and completed on an entirely *pro bono* basis by the international law firm of Weil, Gotshal & Manges, provides a much-needed comparative analysis of different aspects of the practice of solitary confinement, such as its purpose and authorization; challenges and appeals concerning, and limitations on, its use; and accommodation, access to the outside world, and the use of physical restraints.

Distinguished panelists from civil society, Government, and academia will join the Special Rapporteur to discuss recent developments in international legal norms and domestic policies and regulations concerning the use of solitary confinement, as well as the practical challenges posed by efforts to implement and revise laws and regulations on solitary confinement in different jurisdictions around the world. Panelists will provide input and comments on both the substantive and advocacy levels, thereby offering strategies for Member States, practitioners, and advocates on how to proceed with efforts to review and reform the practice of solitary confinement worldwide.
